I am a native of the Bristol Bay region, born and raised in Dillingham.

Our culture consists of commercial fishing, subsistence fishing, hunting and trapping on the Nushagak River system. We rely on these resources. It is our way of life and has been our heritage for centuries.

We wish to keep it this way for our children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren to be passed on for generations to come.

The Alaska Federation of Natives has stated that "the mission of AFN is to enhance and promote the cultural, economic and political voice of the entire Alaska Native community."

Mining is not our culture. The aftermath of mining destroys the land and contaminates the water system, which in turn causes health problems. The history of mining is documented, and there is proof of this. Look at Fort Knox near Fairbanks, Red Dog near Kotzebue, Gibraltar Mine in British Columbia and many mines in the Lower 48.

A handful of people in the communities near the Pebble mine site are the only ones profiting on this venture. They are not looking at the long-term damages that follow the making of a fast buck.

The Bristol BayTimes published an advertisement on Sept. 13, addressed to the Bristol Bay Native Corp. shareholders, encouraging us to "maintain a neutral position on Pebble."

The advertisement also stated that the Pebble project "continues to invest millions of dollars in our village each year."

The advertisement was signed by Ralph Angasan Sr. of Alaska Peninsula Corp., Lorene A. Arce of Iliamna Natives Limited and Norman Jacko of Pedro Bay Corp.

In Chris Klabunde's commentary ("Push for Pebble jeopardizes improvements in fishery") in the same issue of The Bay Times, he offers proof of damages from mining.

The only communities benefiting are in the Iliamna Lake area. Yet runoff will contaminate the Nushagak River system to save world-class sport trout fishing.

To boycott Fairbanks businesses operated by Rep. Jay Ramras during AFN meetings is not right. Ramras is only trying to bring out facts that AFN failed to research and supply to the public.

If the mine is opened, AFN should change its mission statement, and its meeting should be boycotted for backing Pebble mine and the select few that will profit from this fiasco.

My family members are APC shareholders and have not been asked how we feel about the matter.

I don't know who voted for the ad but do know there are a number of board members who work for Northern Dynasty or have family who do. I feel these people should have abstained from voting on the matter. Why is it we can't pay a dividend or buy shareholders a drum of oil but we can pay for ads that don't help us at all?

I don't feel the mine is going to be able to care for all the subsistence, cannery workers and commercial fisherman who will be displaced by the mine. There are so many of our children who have fished to pay for their schooling, and we have a number of teachers, nurses, lawyers and doctors who are from Bristol Bay. We even have someone running for the Senate now who claims to have got his start sliming salmon.

I am an elder now and don't commercial fish anymore, but I still have to subsist to survive and could not have raised my family without subsistence and commercial fishing.

I was offered a trip to Anchorage to attend a meeting with Northern Dynasty but refused because I didn't approve of the mine. Tickets to Anchorage, a hotel room and spending money look good sometimes, especially when you live in the bush, but not when it could ruin my fish.

We have always had some very poor fishing seasons, usually not as long as this one, but it seems to be on the rebound.

I would be very interested knowing how many other APC shareholders feel like I do about the ad. I speak only for myself not my family or other shareholders.

Cherry cyanide?

Is Jay Ramras killing our fish with cyanide?

I was perusing the Pike's Waterfront Web site (<http://www.pikeslodge.com/faq.html>) and found a photo of what I'm certain to be a sapling of a chokecherry tree. Most people may not be aware but every part of a chokecherry tree, except for the fruit, contains cyanide.

Black cherry contains cyanogenic precursors that release cyanide whenever the leaves are damaged (frost, trampling, drought, wilting, leaves blown down from the tree during storms). Most animals can consume small amounts of healthy leaves, bark and fruit safely; however, when hungry animals consume large amounts of fresh leaves or small amounts of damaged leaves (as little as two ounces), clinical cases of poisoning will occur, and many animals may die. This is especially true if there is no other forage for the animals to consume, or in the case of pets, when confined and/or bored, the chances for toxic levels of ingestion can occur.

Healthy cherry leaves contain prunasin, a cyanide precursor that in itself is non-toxic. When the leaves are damaged, the prunasin molecule is split and free cyanide (also called prussic acid or hydrocyanic acid) is liberated.

One can only wonder how much cyanide from Jay's trees have already leached into the Chena River? And one can only wonder what devastating impacts his apparent ignorance of the problem has already caused our subsistence fishery? In light of Jay's opposition to the Pebble Prospect, perhaps he should stop throwing stones since his own house is built of so much glass.

## Test case pending against Anglo American

In what is seen as a test case by their legal team, 10 former gold miners suffering from a debilitating lung disease have brought a damages claim against the Anglo American Corporation in the Johannesburg High Court.

No date has yet been set for the trial. A report in the Sunday Tribune says if the eight surviving miners and the widows of two who have died since the case was filed in 2004 win the R20m they are claiming, the implications would be significant. Richard Meeran, a consultant to the Legal Resources Centre, has taken on the case. Meeran made headlines when he successfully represented 7 500 South Africans in the London High Court in a multimillion-pound damages lawsuit against British-based multi-national Cape plc for asbestos-related diseases contracted by miners and communities living close to asbestos mines and dumps. In 2004 former gold miners from Welkom approached him to help them with claims for compensation for silicosis and phthisis.
